This year we mark our 14th anniversary of honoring New Mexico humanitarians, and our 22nd anniversary of presenting the Harold B. Albert Jewish Community Service Award. We celebrate our award recipients, as well as the easing of pandemic-related restrictions that allow us to have both an in-person gathering and a virtual awards program. Your support of the JCC helped us to continue offering many of our educational, cultural, and fitness programs in virtual formats during the pandemic closures and subsequent capacity restrictions. And your support of the New Mexico Humanitarian Awards allows us to continue the tradition of recognizing and celebrating those in our community who work quietly every day to improve the lives of others.

We are grateful for your belief in our mission. Besides operating a premier family-friendly fitness facility, the JCC proudly serves our entire community with programming for infants, toddlers, children to seniors, and everyone in between. The JCC is an inclusive and caring community that is guided by Jewish values. Through the generosity of our donors, we support the participation of individuals and families at the JCC by offering financial aid for tuition at the David and Martha Cooper Family Enrichment Center, membership, camp, and swim lessons.

The JCC partners with other non-profit organizations to serve the needs of the greater Albuquerque community. Throughout the year the JCC holds collection drives for food, kitchen items, clothing, school supplies, personal health items, and more to organizations such as HopeWorks, Title One, Navajo Nation, Locker 505, Haven House, and Roadrunner Food Bank. The JCC also provides direct volunteer service to HopeWorks and the Title One Summer program.

Those whom we honor this evening embody the ideal of tikkun olam, repairing our world. Fred Nathan, the founder and executive director of the nonpartisan think tank Think New Mexico, has followed the example set by his parents in devoting his career to social change to strengthen public accountability, improve public education, and enhance the lives of the less-privileged among us.

Mary Martinez, owner of Home Instead Senior Care, recently opened the Isabelle Gallegos Aging Resource Center, a unique new co-working space in Albuquerque to host geriatric counselors, financial advisers, housing experts and other professionals in the field of aging.

Jennifer Landau, co-founder of New Mexico Immigrant Law Center, strives to advance justice and equity by empowering low-income immigrant communities through collaborative legal service, advocacy, and education. Their vision is a vibrant New Mexico where all people-regardless of immigration status-can achieve their full potential and are treated with dignity and respect.

Shira Greenberg is the founder and artistic director of Keshet Dance and Center for the Arts, utilizing the arts as a catalyst for change. She began teaching dance in NM's juvenile prison system in 1997 and developed Keshet's M3 Program (Movement + Mentorship = Metamorphosis).





A Message from Harold & Carole Albert

Shira Greenberg has dual American and Israeli citizenship, having been born in Minneapolis, Minnesota and moving to Israel when she was one year old. Fluent in Hebrew she studied at Kibbutz Ma'agan Michael, Ithaca College and Hebrew University in Jerusalem and ultimately graduated from the prestigious Interlochen Arts Academy.



When Shira, on a whim, moved to Albuquerque in 1994, little did she know the impact she would have on our City, State and Jewish Community. Many of us know of Shira's passion for dance. Taking that passion and developing it into something substantially more than just artistic talent, gave all of us the benefit of her ability to unite creativity into working with children, other professional artists and working on community social justice issues and support for broader community needs.

Upon her arrival in Albuquerque, Shira earned her living by teaching Hebrew and dance. She quickly learned that there was only one dance studio in Albuquerque and realized that her dreams could be fulfilled if she could establish a center for dance and performing arts in Albuquerque. But first she returned to Minneapolis to spend time developing a business plan, learning how to run a non-profit organization, and taking courses in business-for-the arts programs, an educational process that took over ten months. Finally in 1996 she felt prepared and returned to Albuquerque to open Keshet (rainbow in Hebrew) Dance Company in a 1600 square foot warehouse. The dance company rapidly expanded into Keshet Dance and Center for the Performing Arts. Her enrollment exceeds 1,000 students annually in a studio of over 8,700 square feet and collaboration with world famous artists.

Shira established a nationally recognized program by which Keshet teaches dance and mentoring to youth incarcerated within the juvenile prison system thus engaging and educating and empowering them to lead productive lives upon their release. This program has been expanded to five cities, and now includes field research and return to work opportunities. For her work in this area, Shira has been recognized by the Governor's office, the New Mexico Legislature and the White House.

In addition to her communal work through Keshet, Shira has served on the Solomon Schechter Jewish day school board of directors, on the National Board of the Cohesion Dance Project, and on the department of Albuquerque Economic and Development. For four years Shira has chaired the Sister City Board between Albuquerque and Rehovot, Israel, thereby exchanging artistic and cultural activities.

Our City, our State and our Jewish Community have all benefited from Shira's belief, desire and determination. For these reasons, and so many more, we join with her husband Rick Letscher and their son Joey in saying how proud we all are of Shira's accomplishments. We are truly honored that Shira Greenberg will have her name permanently inscribed as this year's recipient of the Harold B. Albert Community Service Award.

Shira Greenberg - Keshet Dance and Center for the Arts

hira Greenberg is the Founder Artistic Director Keshet, launching the organization in 1996 - utilizing the arts as a catalyst for change. She began teaching dance in NM's juvenile prison system in 1997 and developed Keshet's M3 Program (Movement Mentorship

Metamorphosis), which

includes a credited, movement-based curriculum taught in the on-site high school within the juvenile prison focusing on math, science, literacy, and conflict resolution skills in addition to maintaining student/mentor relationships throughout and beyond the parole and reintegration process (currently maintaining a 0% recidivism rate for participants). In 2016, Keshet began the process of codifying and sharing the M3 Program nationally, piloting in five cities across the United States, and in 2021 launched the New Mexico Arts and Justice Network - expanding Keshet's efforts to include policy/advocacy, return-to-work opportunities, field research, and the development of a cohesive network of arts and justice partners throughout the state.

Shira has created over 60 original dance works for stage and film, including "Nutcracker on the Rocks" (which included dancers with disabilities) "Ani Ma'amin" [one of the most moving and beautifully designed dances this viewer has experienced... totally absorbing" - Jennifer Noyer, Albuquerque Journal]; and "A beast an angel and a madwoman" ["Transformative" - Matti Straub-Fisher, Kaos Pilots, Bern, Switzerland].

She has been recognized by multiple organizations and awards including the Martin Luther King, Jr Multicultural Council's Keep the Dream Alive

Award for "creating an environment where the medium of dance is used to build cross-cultural and social bridges to every aspect of society" and the of former President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities. She has been a guest speaker throughout the US, Europe and Israel, sharing Keshet's integrated approach of the arts in the areas of social justice and economic development. In 2013 with a \$1,000,000 investment from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Greenberg opened the Keshet Center for the Arts, a 30,000 sf performing arts center in Midtown Albuquerque, and within it launched the Keshet Ideas and Innovation Community (KIIC), a business incubator and resource center for arts entrepreneurs, including choreographic residency programs.

red is founder and Executive Director of Think New Mexico now in its 21st year in Santa Fe. He brings a laser focus to seeking legislative sponsors across the political spectrum, builds supportive coalitions with other organizations and lobbies the governor and legislature to enact one piece of legislation annually.

Think New Mexico is a results-oriented think tank serving New Mexicans through non-partisan public policy research and advocacy. Our mission is to improve the lives of all New Mexicans, especially those who lack a strong voice in the political process. We fulfill this mission by educating the public, the media, and policymakers about some of the most serious challenges facing New Mexico and by developing and advocating for enduring, effective, evidence based solutions. Our approach is to perform and publish sound, nonpartisan, independent research. Unlike many think tanks, Think New Mexico does not subscribe to any ideology. Instead, because New Mexico is at or near the bottom of so many national rankings, our focus is on promoting workable solutions that will lift all New Mexicans up. Results include making full day kindergarten accessible to



every child in New Mexico; repealing the state's regressive tax on food and successfully defeating efforts to reimpose it; creating a Strategic Water Reserve to protect and restore New Mexico's rivers; redirecting millions of dollars a year out of



the state lottery's excessive operating costs and into full tuition scholarships and much more.

Fred Nathan has a bachelor's degree from Williams College, a Law Degree from Northwestern University and a Master of Public Policy from UNM. He was in private practice for three years with Sutin, Thayer & Brown and special counsel to NM Attorney General Tom Udall 1991-1998.

Mary Martinez - Owner of Home Instead

n 2000 Mary started working as a care manager and then became owner of Home Instead Senior Care when the previous owner retired. In 2014, Home Instead was on Albuquerque Business First's Fastest Growing Company; Mary Martinez was named a Top CEO by Business First; Mary was the Albuquerque Hispano Chamber of Commerce's 2020 Board Chair. In 2018, Mary Martinez broke ground on a co-working space behind the Home Instead. The Isabel Gallegos Aging Resource Center, a unique co-working space in Albuquerque will host geriatric counselors, lawyers, counselors and financial advisers, housing experts and other professionals in the field of aging. Mary is involved in the community by serving on several boards including Uniting New Mexicans Against Adult Abuse, the American Heart Association, the Lovelace Medical Center Governing Board, and the Holman's Autism Foundation.

Mary's personal philosophy: Stop stereotyping and see people as individuals; lead by example in supporting marginalized community members in finding employment, growing their businesses, or starting their own businesses.

Mary grew up in Albuquerque and has always been happy to call it home. She was especially close to her





maternal grandmother who was the inspiration for her pursuit of a Gerontology degree from NMSU. Mary is an adamant supporter of New Mexico and has stated, "We will never leave New Mexico. It's home to all of us and more importantly, to the clients we serve. In recent months, Mary has been invited to serve on the national boards of Champions of Aging and the Home Instead Diversity and Inclusion Counsel. She always plans to be a voice and advocate for our community seniors.




New Mexico Immigrant Law Center Jennifer Landau, Cofounder and Executive Director 2021 Humanitarian Award

NMILC was founded in 2010 with the support of many New Mexico immigrant-based organizations, to help address the lack of access to legal services faced by low-income immigrants in New Mexico. Prior to it's inception, there were no legal service organizations in NM providing services to immigrants in need of humanitarian protection or representation in Immigration Court proceedings. Their collaborative, community-based legal service model leverages the expertise and shared resources of local organizations. Now with a staff of 30 and full-time volunteer corp members and offices in ABQ and Santa Fe, their services, mission, and vision have expanded to encompass a wide range of legal issues affecting lowincome immigrants.

NMILC mission is to advance justice and equity by empowering low-income immigrant communities through collaborative legal services, advocacy, and education. In 2019 with the help of 297 volunteers and pro bono attorneys, NMILC provided legal services to 4,766 immigrants. Their vision is a vibrant New Mexico where all people-regardless of immigration status-can achieve their full potential and are treated with dignity and respect. As one of the founders, Jennifer Landau was inspired by her grandparents who came to America as undocumented Polish Holocaust survivors.
